AMARACHI UCHE-EBOH

Youth Leadership Honoree

Talkington School for Young Women Leaders

marachi Uche-Eboh is a name you are going to want to remember. Currently, she is the National FFA champion for her research on anaerobic digestion. The honor is a distinction earned by in-depth research on a significant topic and her impressive ability to present and discuss her findings confidently. It is easy to predict that Amarachi will be a pioneer and will use her curiosity, innovative thinking and thoughtful inquiry to break through any barriers she faces.

With remarkable grace and maturity, Amarachi has already accomplished more than would seem possible. She is an AP Scholar with Distinction which means that she earned a qualifying score on 4 or more AP exams with an average of 4 or higher. Each of those exams is like a college level exam and scoring above 3 gives you college credit. "The maturity, time management, desire and work it takes to reach this level of accomplishment is staggering," said Jenny Cardelli, AP Testing Coordinator at the Talkington School.

Amarachi has a commitment to service and leadership and is very involved with the National FFA, the Lubbock ISD Superintendent's Scholars Program, the Texas Girls Collaborative Project the Talkington Model United Nations and the She Space International U.S. Team. She has further distinguished herself as a Texas FFA Ford Leadership Scholar, the Lubbock District FFA Secretary as a founding member of the Talkington FFA chapter. Additionally, she broadened her global perspective as a Yale Young Global Scholar and a Harvard Undergraduate Internal Relations Winter Intensive Scholar and she is a Global Leadership Adventures Community Development Honors Fellow.

"In my 27 years of experience in education Amarachi stands out as an extraordinary individual---a rare jewel poised to make significant contributions to international diplomacy, environmental mitigation or energy and development," said Michelle Pieniazek, Lubbock ISD Coordinator for Agricultural Education.

There are so many honors and accolades for the work Amarachi has already produced, her resume would rival many professional curriculum vitas. Her biggest challenge may be trying to decide between all of options she will have but Amarachi is not worried. "My career goals and plans will change over the years, and I place all of my intentions to the Lord who will guide me and reveal his purpose as I transition throughout the stages of my life."

Underlying all of the accomplishment, Amarachi manages to be a well-rounded, incredibly grounded teenager. She was elected Homecoming Queen this year and loves to dance particularly Afrobeats Zumba and Hip Hop. In addition, at age 12, she ranked 37 out of 158 in US Club Open Swimming. Sarah is currently a member of the Lubbock Economic Development Alliance Board and the Lubbock Methodist Hospital Board, where she served as chairperson. Professor of Violin, Texas Tech University

Concertmaster of the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra

nnie Chalex-Boyle was born in Arlington Heights, Illinois and started learning violin as a child. She is a graduate of University of Southern California and The Juilliard School. In addition to being an extraordinary performer, Ms. Boyle is a sought-after teacher who has devoted much of her life to nurturing young performers in West Texas. She is an active participant and teacher in music festivals around the world. Annie is described as a phenomenal violin soloist and chamber musician and her performances have been hailed as "brilliant", "eloquent and poignant", and "commanding".

She is married to John Boyle, also a professor of music at Texas Tech University. Together they have three teenaged daughters: Sage, Mae and Grace. The family made Lubbock "home" in 2011 and are exemplary in promoting music education as an integral part of early childhood development. Annie teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in applied music, chamber music and pedagogy. In addition, Annie's national teaching experience includes Interlochen Arts Academy in Michigan, Chicago Symphony Youth Orchestra as a chamber coach, Hot Springs Music Festival, DFW WOW Young Artists Program, Midwest Young Artists Chamber Music Program in Wisconsin and Chamber Music Center in Austin. Internationally, she has taught at the Orfeo Music Festival in Italy. She also established the Lake City String Academy in Colorado. When asked about her professional contributions, Annie is quick to point to her pride in working with young musicians and her role as an arts advocate for our youth.

Annie also serves as the concertmaster for Lubbock Symphony which is the highest ranked member of the orchestra. "Ms. Boyle is my righthand person, liaison colleague and mentor in all aspects of my life as a conductor," said David Cho, Lubbock Symphony Music Director. She is an important public face of the symphony and regularly performs recitals with her colleagues for patrons who support the arts in our community.

Annie is passionate about using arts as a mechanism for social change. "Music can change the way we communicate with each other and help propel communities to grow together with a common goal of sharing great art." She is serious about her art and very open about the challenges of trying to balance being a mother, a wife, a woman in academia, while maintaining an international performing and teaching career. It sounds exhausting and impossible but Annie is delightfully present as she explains, "I have learned to give myself grace and doing the best at what I'm doing IN THE MOMENT is all I can do."

She carries that philosophy forward in many ways because her advice to young women in the workplace who are facing big challenges is "Do it anyways. There will always be a better time, better location, better job, better pay. Bloom where you are planted...you are unique and can make a difference wherever you might be." KELLY CRISWELL

Deputy Executive Director

South Plains Association of Governments

ost people do not realize the work that goes on behind the scenes to grow communities and strengthen infrastructure. But, if you wanted to know anything about that process, Kelly Criswell would be the one to call. Under her direction, SPAG has assisted rural cities and counties in acquiring numerous infrastructure grants. She led an effort to help five South Plains communities apply for and receive grants from the Texas Department of Agriculture to establish Revolving Loan Funds (RLF) with the goal of helping small businesses create and retain jobs. TDA awarded only seven of those grants in the entire state. Because of Kelly's work, five of those grants were awarded to cities in the SPAG region. Her leadership led to to grants from the US Economic Development Administration in excess of \$6.7 million to establish COVID Revolving Loan Funds to assist adversely impacted small businesses. Kelly is responsible for the oversight of the Caprock Business Finance Corporation which operates the SBA 504 Loan program, SPAG LoanStar Fund and SPAG CORE specialty loan programs which cumulatively have a small business portfolio of over \$60 million.

Amazing as it may sound, Kelly began her career at SPAG as a part-time high school student intern where she fell in love with the impact government could have on community quality of life. She went on to Texas Tech, completed her degree and then advanced her understanding and expertise through the Texas Tech Certified Public Manager program in 2011. She is an ardent volunteer serving on Lubbock Cystic Fibrosis Great Strides Walk Committee and on the United Way Program Review and Loaned Executive Committees. She is active at the national and regional levels taking part in advisory roles to understand broader regional issues. She has won numerous awards and recognitions including the "Top 20 under 40" Award from the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

For Kelly---whether she is helping rural communities access water during severe droughts, helping small businesses build new facilities or finding ways to secure housing for elderly and low-income residents---her real success has been in building a team that is dedicated to public service and the local communities they serve. She speaks about finding her own place in the professional world and how important it was to build a network of mentors. "The guidance I received particularly from other women, inspired me to pay it forward by creating supportive environments and opportunities for women in the professional sphere. I am deeply committed to helping women feel empowered and supported, with the hope that they, in turn will mentor and uplift those that follow," she said.

Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources Frenship ISD

n the 2024 Niche Ratings, Frenship ISD is ranked as the 14th "Best Place to Teach" which puts them in the top one percent of Texas public school districts. As her colleagues attest Rhonda Dillard would never be one to take any credit for that ranking. On the other hand, when your job is the acquisition and development of talented educators and your responsibility includes supervision and support of nine elementary campus principals, it is clear the important role she plays in developing Frenship ISD's culture of excellence.

Ms. Dillard is a passionate advocate for the importance of quality public education in the lives of children. She has committed more than 40 years to public education serving first in Lubbock ISD and then with Frenship and she is always promoting the importance and joy of being a teacher. She is very proud that two of her daughters went on to become teachers and two granddaughters are special education assistants. She is so committed to developing teachers that she played a key role in developing a new Career and Technology Education (CTE) pathway at Frenship High School to allow students to explore the various roles and responsibilities of being a teacher. Rhonda Dillard is a hard worker. Often the first to arrive and the last to leave, she is a champion at serving others. "Even outside of work hours, she is just a phone call away always ready to lend her support and encouragement." said Stacy Davis, Principal Crestview Elementary.

In her nomination packet, many spoke of the way Rhonda inspires them, encourages them---how she takes time to listen to their concerns. She recently went through her own health crisis and after several surgeries and against incredible odds, she returned to work with the determination and grace of a warrior. Superintendent Michelle McCord summed it up, "Rhonda's greatest inspiration for others, including me, is how she lives each day. No one understands better than Rhonda that one never knows what tomorrow will bring. Therefore, she lives each day like it is her last and she does what she is best at: Serving and leading others."

Born in Plainview and married to Dale Dillard, she received her Bachelor's degree in education from Texas Tech University and Master of Education from Wayland Baptist. She will be retiring this year after 42 years of service in education to the children, families, and colleagues of our community.

NEDRA HOTCHKINS

Executive Director **Lubbock Children's Health Clinic**

Porn in Enid, Oklahoma and raised throughout Texas and Oklahoma, Ms. Hotchkins graduated from the University of Utah with a Master's in Educational Leadership. Nedra's career is marked by a commitment to service, advocacy and mentorship that she diligently nurtures. She has been honored with the Mary B. DuPree Living Life Award and Sister Called to Serve Award as well as the YWCA Outstanding Achievement Award in 2016 for Social Justice in Salt Lake City, Utah. Each of these recognitions in honor of her dedication to engaging in community for meaningful change.

Ms. Hotchkins is a member of the Women of 100, a past President of the Lubbock Association of Fundraising Professionals (AFP) and former Vice President of the Lubbock Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. She is a member of the Junior League of Lubbock and serves on several prominent Boards including the Community Foundation of West Texas, Association of Fundraising Professionals, Covenant Children's Board and Frenship Advisory Board.

In her current role with Lubbock Children's Health Clinic, Nedra's passion is to spread the understanding that healing goes beyond physical treatment. Healing requires a holistic approach that addresses broader social and emotional needs. This strategic approach has expanded the services offered at LCHC and redefined how these services are delivered. The clinic now offers a Food Pantry, Diaper Depot, Mental and Behavioral Health Counseling and a Clothing Closet that provides seasonal clothing for children. These services are free of charge, ensuring that every child, regardless of economic background can have access to the resources needed to thrive. She advocates every day to ensure that every child and family feels seen, valued and cared for and that transforms how we approach community healthcare. She fosters an environment where inclusivity and dignity are the foundations of care regardless of the ability to pay.

"In the last 7 years I have watched this small clinic grow exponentially and its medical outreach to the children in need in East and North Lubbock has no comparison," said Dr. Jessica Gray, former board President of the clinic. These thoughts were echoed by Dr. Amy Thompson of Covenant Health who called out Ms. Hotchkins leadership in developing a comprehensive child wellness program. "Nedra's ability to bring together diverse stakeholders, secure necessary funding and mobilize volunteers has been instrumental in the program's success and positively impacting countless lives."

Nedra is an accomplished speaker and is sought after for her expertise in fostering belonging and inclusivity. She frequently travels across the country with her husband Dr. Bryan Hotchkins, sharing insights on belonging, equity and community engagement. She and Bryan have two children, Yssis and Osiris, both young adults.





LINDSEY MAESTRI

Executive Director

Louise Hopkins Underwood Center for the Arts

Porn in Springdale, Arkansas, Lindsey Maestri joined LHUCA in June 2017, serving as Community Engagement Manager and Interim Director before accepting her current position as Executive Director in December 2018. She holds a Master of Fine Arts degree from Louisiana State University and a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the University of Arkansas. Lindsey has a background in collaboration and has been a member of the Ireland-based international arts collective, Expanded Draught, for over 10 years. As an artist herself, Lindsey often collaborates with her husband and Texas Tech University sculpture professor, Cody Arnall. Prior to joining the staff of LHUCA, Lindsey was the Executive Director of the Yeiser Art Center in Paducah, KY and Exhibitions and Programs Manager for Tennessee Tech University's Appalachian Center for Craft.

Lindsey has expanded LHUCA's role as the centerpiece of Lubbock's art community. "Under her leadership, the organization developed a robust array of programming including exhibitions, workshops, artist talks and community outreach initiatives," said Elizabeth Grigsby, Lubbock Arts Alliance.

In her time with LHUCA Lindsey has brought in over \$2.6 million in grant funding for the organization and has increased the center's operating budget by 50%. She has grown LHUCA's supporting Membership program from 20 enrollees to an active membership of over 240 through participation in the North American Reciprocal Museum Program which features benefits from over 1000 museums nationwide.

As you might expect, Ms. Maestri is not one to sit on the sidelines. When asked for the advice she would give to young women, her answer is no surprise: "Don't get stuck! Take risks. Move. Make lateral moves. Volunteer. Do what it takes to get to a place you feel valued and you don't dread going to every day."

Lindsey's impact on LHUCA is palpable. Mitzi Ziegner wrote, "She works to inspire her staff and board to make Louise Hopkins Underwood's vision of providing free access to the arts for all---regardless of background, income, education, age, identity or ability level--- a reality every day."

Lindsey was a first generation college student and that posed some of her most challenging obstacles. While her parents and grandparents were incredibly supportive of her desire to pursue higher education, they were ill-equipped to help her navigate the system. She found several mentors along the way to help her understand the logistics of college and the career paths that were available. She encourages everyone to realize the power of mentoring and advocating for young people because you never know how far a little encouragement can take someone.

Lindsey explains the importance of the arts this way, "We all need places to feel and be safe, especially when the world might not look like what we want it to right now. The arts provide that space for so many people to feel accepted or creatively nourished. I want to keep working to make that space for people."

CHIBUZO O'SUOJI, MD

Pediatric Hematologist/Oncologist **TTUHSC**

n 2018, she was named TTUHSC Pediatric Department Teacher of the Year. The honor speaks to how approachable Dr. Chibuzo O'Suoji is about an incredibly complex and challenging area of medicine. It also speaks to the passion Dr. O'Suoji brings to her work every day. Dr. O'Souji will tell you that the incidence of childhood cancer is steadily rising and her goal is to find a cure so that no parent her has to hear the words, "your child has cancer".

Dr. O'Souji received her undergraduate training and Medical Schooling at the University of Nigeria and did her pediatric residency at the University of Illinois in Chicago. She also received a Master of Science in Clinical Research at Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine. She received Board Certifications in General Pediatrics in 2007 and in Pediatric Hematology/Oncology in 2013.

Dr. O'Suji has made a significant impact on pediatric hematology and oncology both locally through her clinic and on a broader scale through her research, case studies and scholarly publications. Her contributions reflect her dedication to improving outcomes for children with complex hematological and oncological conditions as well as in advancing medical knowledge within her field. Her publications on rare conditions bring attention to less common but critical areas of study and her research on innovative treatments using targeted therapies demonstrates her advanced role in applying cutting edge solutions to improve patient outcomes.

Dr. O'Souji is a dynamic educator and inspires the next generation of healthcare professionals through her mentorship and lectures. She provides 80% of the Pediatric Hematology/Oncology core curriculum lectures at TTUHSC and ensures the residents receive a comprehensive understanding of complex topics. Part of her mission is to introduce potential physicians to the excitement of finding cures and she does that through the atmosphere created in her clinic. Her involvement in the TTAP Mentorship program and her guidance of resident research projects showcase her dedication to shaping the careers of young physicians and empowers them to pursue their own academic and professional excellence.

Dr. O'Suoji's excellence extends beyond her clinical practice and classroom. As a mother and wife she maintains a remarkable balance, showing up as a devoted supporter in her children's lives whether it's rebounding basketballs for her son or cheering on her daughter at games.

Dr. O'Suoji is very open: Being a black female physician with an accent has presented significant challenges. That was not going to stop her. She says she used hard work and a positive attitude, impeccable skill and the result is that patients and parents know she gives the best care possible and in return they have the utmost trust in her. Her professional advice to young women then is simple: You can be whatever you wish to be professionally. It may be difficult but with hard work, you can overcome any challenges that confront you.





RAEGAN HIGGINS SIWATU

Professor of Mathematics and Associate Vice Provost for Faculty Recruitment and Hiring **Texas Tech University**

n today's American college campuses, only 4% of full professors are African American. Only 1.4% are African American women and when you add in the filter of being a full professor in the mathematical sciences, you can understand why Raegan Higgins Siwatu is such a stand-out honoree. "My journey to achieving this milestone was far from linear, but I was fortunate to be guided and mentored by many remarkable women who paved the way before me." She recently took on the role of President of the Association for Women in Mathematics and for Raegan, it is the perfect platform to inspire young girls and encourage them to pursue math and science endeavors.

Surprising as it may seem, math didn't come easily to Raegan. She was not doing well in her 8th grade math class. Her trajectory changed when her teacher would not let her give up. It would have been easy for the teacher to let her off the hook and shuffle her down a different path. Instead, the teacher was resolute: "you can do this--you just have to work hard." It was the spark for the resilience and determination that characterizes Raegan 's work and life today.

Raegan feels passionately that creating a sense of belonging in mathematics must be done early and it requires involvement at every level of the community and especially when girls begin to doubt their math abilities. Now, in her college classrooms, she gets to practice that mentoring philosophy: meeting students where they are, challenging assumptions and offering guidance and encouragement as they navigate their journey to the next step in their lives.

Dr. Siwatu has made remarkable contributions to the field of mathematics with a focus on oscillation and time scales. Her research has significantly advanced the field and offered extensive applications to biology and health care. She has a long list of honors and publications --- all with impressive titles---but perhaps most exciting is the way she approaches teachiHer classroom is an interactive space where students explore concepts collaboratively and deepen their understanding through active problem-solving. She offers a spark to mathematics that is exciting, engaging and relevant.

Dr. Siwatu has a busy life: wife, mother, professional and community volunteer. As you would expect from an analytical mind, she has a formula: focus on just finding harmony---"the pleasing integration of different parts--- roles and responsibilities --- working together in a way that feels right."

Raegan offers some foundational advice for young women and her answers tell a lot about Raegan herself. Be authentic. Be persistent. Build your village. These are the words of a woman of excellence.

THE HUMAN BEAN SUPPORTS YWCA WOMEN'S HEALTH INITIATIVE

n October 18th, The Human Bean poured more than just coffee—they poured support into the lives of local women through their Coffee for a Cure event. For one day. 100% of sales from The Human Bean were donated to the YWCA Women's Health Initiative (WHI). The result? A generous contribution of \$3,024.88 that will go far beyond dollars and cents.

For the more than 1,000 women served annually by WHI on the South Plains, this funding translates into life-saving healthcare. Mammograms, biopsies, and cervical cancer screenings are often out of reach for uninsured women, yet WHI

ensures they receive the critical services they need. Even beyond screenings, WHI plays an essential role in helping uninsured women diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer by guiding them through the Medicaid application process under the Breast and Cervical Cancer program. As the only contractor for the Texas Healthy Women Breast and Cervical Cancer Services (BCCS) program in the region, WHI stands as a vital safety net for women who might otherwise slip through the cracks.



At the YWCA of Lubbock, we believe that every child deserves the opportunity to learn, grow, and thrive in an environment tailored to their needs. Thanks to the SMART Grant (Supporting Mental Health and Resil-

iency in Texans), our Behavioral and Education Support (BES) program—proudly known as the BESTeam—is making an impact on the children and families we serve.

The SMART Grant has provided invaluable resources, allowing us to:

- Employ a dedicated social worker and six child specialists trained in special needs, behavioral support, and student trauma.
- Partner with Texas Tech for speech therapy and occupational therapy with doctoral students, and the Burkhart Center for Autism.
- Collaborate with the Buckner Family Hope Center to offer family training.
- Construct a specialized classroom and sensory room.
- Provide essential learning materials and fund monthly family events.
- Offer ongoing parent training and monthly parenting tips.

The BES program isn't just about providing resources—it's about changing lives. Take, for example, a single mother of five children, one of whom has special needs. Through support and referrals from our program, she receives in-home training, and her child benefits from teacher training, sensory room access, and specialized materials.

Another family of ten actively participates in our family events, and the parent often reaches out to express gratitude for the support and encouragement received from our team.

YWCA families can be referred to the program by teachers or staff, or they can request to join directly. Our mission is to ensure that every family that needs help knows that we are here for them every step of the way.

THE IMPACT

Participants completed the Child Youth Resiliency Measure-Revised (CYRM-R) in November 2024, and a post-test in February 2025.

Positive findings from the post-test reveal an increase in above average resiliency scores in participants ages 10+. Above average scores increased from 44.44% to 66.67%.

Positive findings from the post-test also revealed an increase in above average relational/caregiver resiliency scores in participants ages 10+. Above average scores increased from 51.16% to 66.67%

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THE Heart OFAN OVERCOMER

Karen Kelley is a self-proclaimed breast cancer overcomer (she's not a fan of the term "survivor"). She's also one of the YWCA's most popular teacher's aides among the preschool set. Join her on the playground and you see how they flock to her - her smile and upbeat personality are infectious.



She was very serious, though, when we sat down to talk about her bout of breast cancer. In some senses, Kelley is lucky, her grandmother died of breast cancer when she was a teenager. Because she was very close to her grandmother, it made a big impression on her; so much so that she started getting mammograms when she was 32.

"It was my grandmother on my father's side but after seeing what she went through, I still wanted to be sure it (cancer) was caught early if it came my way," said Kelley.

Karen made the right choice, her cancer was detected via mammogram, her tumor was a scant .1mm in diameter. Like many women, Karen has dense breasts which make self- exams less effective when cancer is small.

Kelly said, "Because my breasts are so dense, they had to do a second mammogram with a 3D machine to confirm the cancer," said Kelley. "I can't emphasize enough how important it is to advocate for yourself and push through any red tape or obstacles that are put in your way when you want additional medical care, it's so important."

As a YWCA employee, Kelley has first-hand knowledge and easy access to the organization's Women's Health Initiative (WHI) program and staff.

Kelley continued, "After I was diagnosed, I went to visit Anne Garcia, who is the YWCA's WHI director. She was able to offer me support as I went through my chemo and radiation treatment and helped me with Medicaid. It meant my family and I didn't have thousands of dollars of debt after I finished all my treatment. She was also just so supportive whenever I needed it!"

Today, Kelley's cancer is in remission and she is moving forward with a double mastectomy.

Kelley smiled and said, "I'm ready to move on with my life and I don't want the cancer to come back. This seems like the best route for me. It has been a long journey and I'm ready for it to be over. I want to spend time with my family and my sweet friends in the YWCA preschool!"


